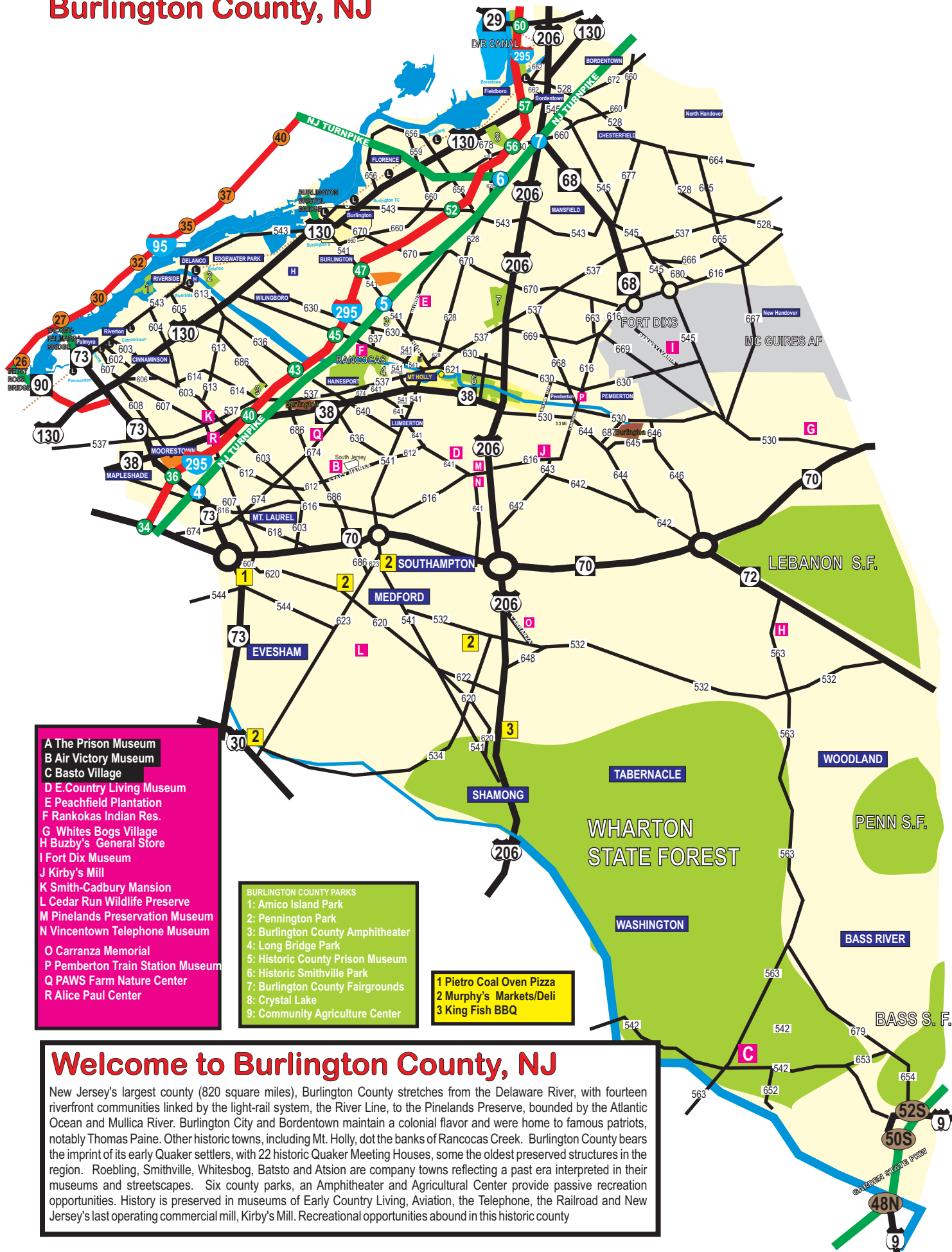


Burlington County, NJ

New Jersey's largest county (820 square miles), Burlington County stretches from the Delaware River, with fourteen riverfront communities linked by the light-rail system, the River Line, to the Pinelands Preserve, bounded by the Atlantic Ocean and Mullica River. Burlington City and Bordertown maintain a colonial flavor and were home to famous patriots, notably Thomas Paine. Other historic towns, including Mt. Holly, dot the banks of Rancocas Creek. A Burlington County Prison Museum

The Burlington County Prison Museum is a national historic landmark located in the heart of historic Mount Holly, New Jersey. Designed by Robert Mills, one of America's first native-born and trained architects, the Burlington County Prison was completed in 1811. As one of Mills' first independent architectural designs, the interior vaulted ceilings of poured concrete and brick and stone construction made the building virtually fireproof. Not only is the structure well suited to its purpose and virtually maintenance free, it also incorporates the philosophies of penal reform that were advocated during the period. In short, this structure was a fine example of innovative interior planning, fireproofing, heating and ventilation systems and the growing notion of social responsibility to rehabilitate criminals. In fact, it was so well constructed that it remained in constant use until 1965. We hope you enjoy your visit. As you tour this museum we remind you that this building was a prison for 154 years...at the time of its closing it was the oldest continually used prison in the United States. B Air Victory Museum

The Air Victory Museum, located at the South Jersey Regional Airport in Lumberton, NJ, is a 501(c)3 educational museum. Run entirely by volunteers, the museum is home to a number of historic aircraft and artifacts related to aviation and aerospace. Visitors can experience an up-close look at such history making aircraft as the United States' first combat jet, the Lockheed P-80 Shooting star, and the real "STAR" of the movie Top Gun", the venerable Grumman F-14 Tomcat. Also featured is a comprehensive collection of military uniforms from around the world, and a huge collection of scale model aircraft. Our research library, well in excess of 4,000 volumes of books, magazines and videos, is available for those wishing to read or do research. C Batsto Village

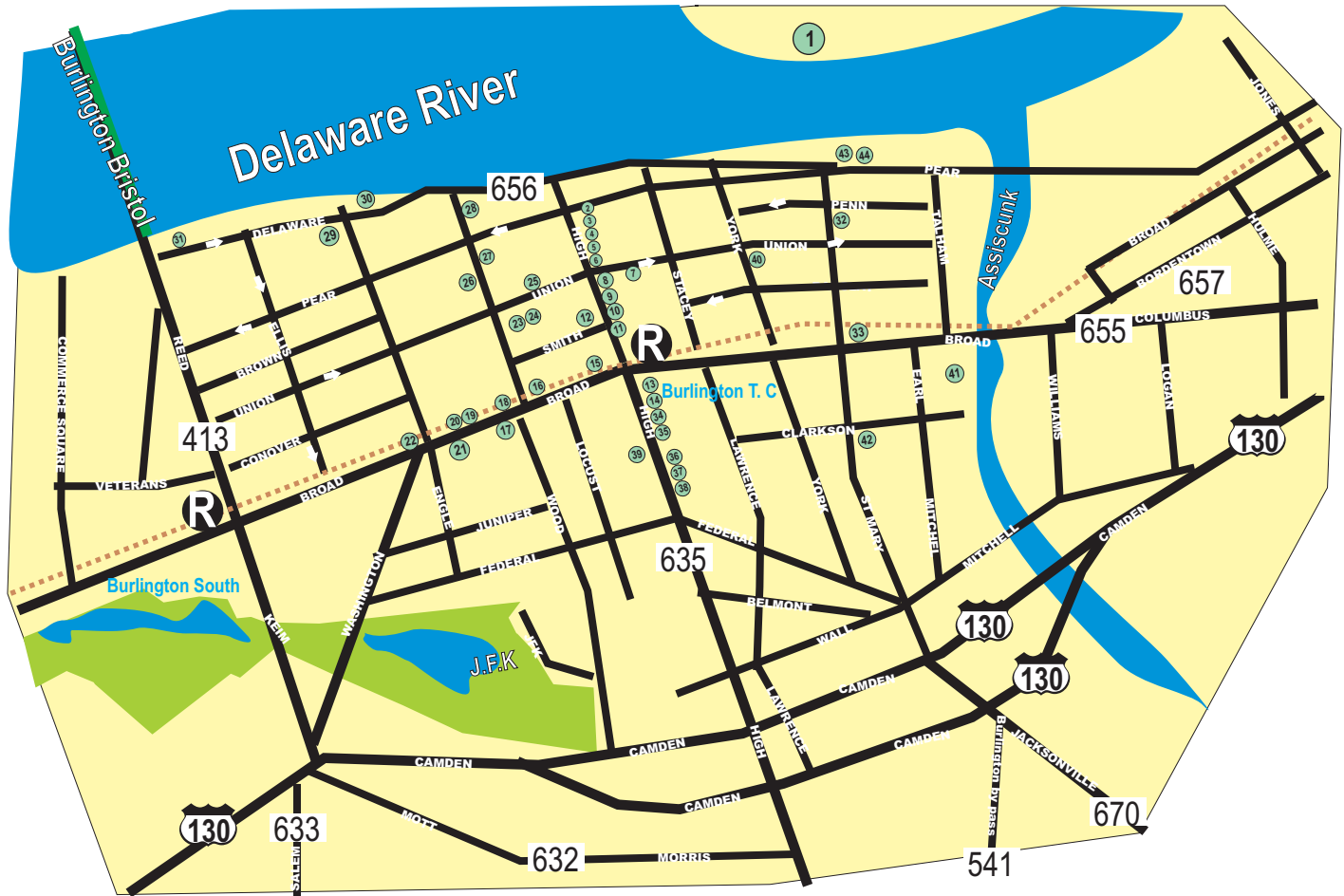
Batsto Village, a New Jersey State Historic Site located in the Wharton State Forest, was prominent in the bog iron industry in the 1760's to the mid 1800's, producing pots, stoves, firebacks, and munitions for the American Revolution and the War of 1812. Other operations followed including brick and glass production, farming, cranberry production, and timbering. The Visitor Center Museum contains timelines and artifacts of historic life at Batsto. Visitors may take a walking tour of more than 30 historic village buildings, which include a mansion house, grist and saw mills and workers' homes. Drop by the Annie M. Carter Nature Center for an introduction to the surrounding 120,000 acre Wharton State Forest located on County Route 542 at the Burlington- Atlantic county border.
